Curriculum

What will we learn?

Children will be able to:

Recognise and understand how the reign of the Tudors has had a lasting impact on modern England.

Understand how Henry VIII chose to break from the Catholic Church and created the Church of England and why he did this.

Explore the art of Hans Holbein and experiment using his techniques and skills to recreate his portrait art.

Understand the importance of male succession to the throne.

Use Scratch to create a piece of music inspired by Tudor music.

Recognise how the work of Shakespeare was a popular source of entertainment for the Tudors and still serves the same purpose today. Understand how his work has been adapted and revised and is the inspiration behind many films/programmes/shows/books.

What are the connections to our curriculum past and present?
